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

### YOUR PROPELLER..... WHERE THE RUBBER MEETS THE ROAD



#### PART II

#### Last month in Part I we covered components and terminology used in propellers... so let's continued where we left off:

**Bore:** The bore of the propeller is the tapered hole in the center of the propellers hub where the propeller shaft slides through. The bore is done at the propeller shop because it is would be too costly to carry the propeller pre-bored as there are many different size shafting that a propeller may require. Bore size is based on a formula which goes with the shaft sizing. For example a 24" diameter propeller has a minimum shaft size of 1 3/8" and a maximum shaft size of 2". If a 24" propeller is bored over spec, say to 2 ¼", there may not be enough material left to support the propeller blades load at the hub, which in turn could cause a propeller blade to snap off. If the shaft is under specified size at 1 ¼" the propeller may have too much load and it can cause the shaft to snap. Therefore it is important before buying a propeller new or used that you are aware of what the specified size bore the propeller calls for.

**Blades & Blade Area:** This is where the work gets done. On our powerboats propeller blades usually are either three (3) or four (4) blades depending on their use. On some vessels even five (5) blades are used. In theory the more blades the smoother the propeller, as the load is dispersed over a larger propeller blade area, thus making the load more manageable. As a rule the fewer the amount of blades the faster the propeller is at top end. Most boats leave the factory with three bladed propellers because of this factor.

Pitch always changes with the amount of propeller blades. For example if you can turn a 24" X 24" three bladed propeller to full RPMs and wanted to go to a four bladed propeller, your four bladed propeller would most likely be a 24" X 23". The reduced pitch makes up the load difference due to the increase in surface area caused by the extra propeller blade. This also explains why the three bladed propellers are faster, as it has one additional inch of pitch, which as stated earlier is the force that moves your vessel forward. As you come down in RPMs to the cruise RPMs on most vessels you pick up efficiency due to less slippage with the extra blade.

Today there are also propellers made with different blade area. Blade area is the amount of surface on each blade. The surface can be increased or decreased depending on the shape of the propeller blade. For example the newer models called DQX have a larger blade area and shape then a conventional Dyna Quad Propeller Blade. On a 24" X 24" Dyna Quad Propeller the blade area is approximately 77 square inches and on at 24"X 24" DQX the blade area is approximately 83 square inches. Increased blade area is important on a propeller when diameter clearance with the bottom of the hull becomes a problem. If you need more surface area but you are limited in clearance you can get the same blade area using a 24" DQX as opposed to using a 26" Dyna Quad. So in essence you get the diameter of a larger propeller on a smaller diameter propeller.

This may sound a little confusing but it is really pretty basic math due to load. As you can see a DQX maybe a good way to go if you need more propeller blade area and you have already maxed out on pitch and diameter. The more blade area the more grab and therefore the less slippage. Slippage is important to reduce, however you do not want too much blade area as it then can result in increased drag which reduces the and propeller's overall performance.

On a keeled boat if you have enough diameter then a DQX may give you no improvement. On keeled vessel the diameter is very important because the area on the blades behind the keel and near the hub does not get good water flow and therefore the field of the blades away from the keel needs to do all of the work. On some of the newer, New England Boats you will notice a trend in tapering the keels thinner to allow more water flow to the blades.

However in most applications the four bladed propellers will give the vessel a better cruising speed which in the long run is more important to fisherman because that is where we spend most of or time at cruise speed.

**Material:** Material for propellers varies. Aluminum is used primary for light duty outboards and inboard/outboard (I/O) drives. Aluminum is cheap and easy to repair but also easy to bend. Stainless steel is also used primarily for outboards & I/O drives. Stainless is much harder to bend and repair but is also less forgiving on the drive unit should there be a collision.

For inboard boats the metals of choice are bronze, which is brass, and copper, and Nibral, which is bronze, aluminum and nickel. A Nibral propeller is twice the cost of a bronze propeller in the same size. Bronze at half the price is good value. Bronze propellers are easier to repair; however they also bend easier because they lack the nickel component which adds strength. Bronze propellers work fine on most inboard boats, providing they are not carrying to much load due to excessive pitch.

As a rule of thumb: if the pitch exceeds the diameter then Nibral should be given serious consideration in propeller selection. A bronze propeller with excessive pitch can allow the blade to flex under load which will reduce the performance and possibly weaken the propeller over time.

I hope you enjoyed part two of this series, next month we will conclude our quest for knowledge with how it all works.

The next upcoming show will be sponsored by the New York Sportfishing Federation at the Freeport Recreation Center on February 18-20, 2011. Harry Weinblatt will be speaking about Canyon Tuna Fishing and the now very popular jigging for tuna at 9:00AM and Capt. Larry Festa will speak about Monster Shark Fishing at 10:00AM. Capt Scott Schafer aboard his Sea Spray has reported decent fishing when the weather has allowed him to sail to the Promised Land.

#### **ANNUAL OFFSHORE COD TRIP** April 29, 30 & May 1, 2011

This is the eleventh year that the Freeport Tuna Club will be running this spring time fishing extravaganza. We will be sailing aboard the Viking Starship departing from Montauk once again. In past years we have traditionally fished off the coast of Massachusetts at the Stellwagon National Marine Sanctuary for Cod, Pollack, Haddock, Wolfish and other mixed species. Once again weather permitting and only if the right conditions exist for day one we will be heading to Hydrographers Canyon in search of the biggest kind of tilefish which own the bottom in those depths. If you have ever seen pictures of giant tilefish, this is where they live. We will also look to target wreckfish, which are grouper like in taste and ferocious fighters when hooked. On day two we will look to target Cod, Pollack, and Hake on the offshore wrecks, returning to Montauk late Sunday evening. If the weather is not conducive for the offshore trip we will head back up to Stellwagon Bank and enjoy the traditional fishery which has not disappointed us in the past. The fare for this year's trip is \$300.00 and will be strictly limited to 35 anglers. I will be collecting payment in full at the upcoming General Meeting which is scheduled for February 10th 2011.
