FISHING BULLETIN

ith less than three weeks until spring. The time cannot

pass by quickly enough. After a taste of mild temperatures during January and a few minor snowstorms, which you can count on one hand, this past winter has been a pleasure as compared to others. As the month of March settles in we should start to see a little moderation in weather, hopefully enough for us to start to work on our boats. March and April always have a surprise for us, so we are not out of the woods yet. The areas waters have not cooled down to prior years levels so once again I am optimistic that we will have a strong spring fishery.

On the local fishing front, the only report I have received recently has been from Capt. Scott Schafer aboard his 50/50. On a recent outing accompanied by crew of Capt. Jim Krug and Paul Sposato, they fished a few local drops around the vicinity of the CIA Grounds, south of Montauk. The catch consisted of about three-dozen Ling. The rest of the Montauk fleet has also reported that the cod fishing has gotten off to a slow start. With the mild temperatures this past winter the inshore waters never cooled down enough and the boats have been forced to fish way offshore to locate better quality fish.

The other reports have been coming in from 17 Fathoms area. The local Sheepshead Bay charter fleet

that has been fishing that way this past winter has confirmed the signs of a slowdown. This typically occurs and during this time of the year and has affected the numbers of fish being caught recently. A combination of blackfish and ling are the mainstay of the catches now.

Our Annual Offshore Codfish Trip is sold out. I am currently collecting names for a waiting list. In the past inevitably a spot opens up because of the unexpected. The dates are set for a departure on the evening of Friday April 20 and returning on Sunday evening April 22. We will be sailing aboard the Viking Starship this year. The fare for this much-awaited event is \$ 235.00 per person. I will be collecting the pool money the evening of departure as done in the past. I have also contacted Kobi, the gentleman who has handled the galley for us the last few years. He will be joining us for this year's trip and will be cooking up a storm as he has in the past.

Daylighted with the Time of Year

The early daylight savings time this year has most of us psyched in anticipation for more fishing hours.; The clock leaps forward one hour on March 11th this year, and not a day too soon. But there is one slight cloud in this light sky; the printed tide charts we use will be throne off by this early occurrence. These charts will be off by an hour so, if your fishing depends on the tide changes, don't forget this. Oh, and don't' forget to set your tivo to get those fishing shows on /Sunday at the right time. Especially "Get Wild" with Cindy Garrison on ESPN.

Long Distance Call-Getting Ready for Safety

Hear this; the Coast Guard has declared it illegal to continue to use the 121.5 MHz EPIRB Class A, B and S units. The only exception is the use of the 121.5 in man overboard devices that do not address the satellite

array system but land based stations One of the reasons for the discontinuance is because of the false signals it emits, and the 406 units usage will prevent this.

The new 406 MHz units are more reliable, and meant to be used offshore since their signals are picked up by worldwide COSPAS-SARSET satellites. A new twist is that you must now register your 406 units. This will help in cutting down on false alerts since there will be possible summonses for this violation. You can go to www.beaconregistration.noaa.gov or call 888-212-save. Do a Google search to find places that rent these units on a periodic basis.

Back in Time

Meaning of Small Craft Advisory

There is no legal definition of "small craft". Sustained weather and sea conditions(2 hours or longer), are the basis for the National Weather Service area advisories. For the East Coast "small craft" warnings are called when the winds speeds are between 25-33 knots, or sea/wave are 5-7 feet and greater. Individual captains make the decision as to the degrees of

hazard that exist on the water and safety to the vessel and crew.

I may be a wuss, but if I thought waves that large were out there, I would head back to port and tune up the reels for next time! Hardly small craft warnings to me.
