STRIPER DIARIES



FPISODE 20

With New York's "PAUSE" order in place, I hope everybody is home hunkering down and staying safe. These are unprecedented times for sure.

On the fishing front, the season has kicked off with a bang. For New Jersey residents, who have an open season, reports of keeper bass in

Raritan Bay have been widely reported. Mojos and swim shads have done the trick. As we typically see in late March and early April, fish are also being caught in Little Neck Bay. Locally, the dolphins have arrived off Long Beach and the bunker are back. With most marinas being closed, as "nonessential businesses," launching our boats will be delayed. That may be a good thing, as our health and safety must always come first.

This year New York State has pushed back the deadline for purchasing the 2020 dashboard permits. Typically they were purchased at Jones Beach or Captree State Park, with a deadline of March 31. However, this year permits can be purchased via email or regular mail and I believe the deadline is now April 30. Remember, social distancing is a must when venturing outside. The 4x4 fishing, night sport fishing, and camp hero fishing permits, are a great way to get outside and Cast a line (alone, or with members of your immediate family only). As of today, it appears access to the state beaches is still permissible. Remember, you will need a valid motor vehicle registration, driver's license of the registrant, and to register with the DEC for the free sporting license online. The website is dec.ny.gov and look for "sporting license". Permit applications can be mailed to "permit department - Dashboard permit" PO Box 247, Babylon, NY 11702 or emailed to LongIslandPermits@parks.ny.gov.

Lastly, new size limits for striped bass are in place. For members fishing south of the George Washington Bridge, the slot size is 28 to 35 inches. That means anglers cannot keep a fish less than 28 inches nor greater than 35 inches. The season opens April 1 and ends December 15. For anglers fishing north of the George Washington Bridge, the slot size is 18 to 28 inches. That means anglers cannot keep a fish less than 18 inches nor greater than 28 inches. The season up north opens April 1 and ends November 30. Daily possession limits is one fish per person in both locations.

I hope this message finds everybody well. Remember to stay indoors and stay safe.

Know How it Spreads ...



- The best way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to this virus.
- The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person.
 - ❖ Between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet).
 Through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes or talks.
 - These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.
 - ♦ Some recent studies have suggested that COVID-19 may be spread by people who are not showing symptoms.

Everyone Should:



CLEAN YOUR HANDS OFTEN

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

Avoid close contact



- Avoid close contact with people who are sick
- Stay home as much as possible
- Put distance between yourself and other people.
 - ♦ Remember that some people without symptoms may be able to spread virus.
 - ♦ Keeping distance from others is especially important for people who are at higher risk of getting very sick.

Take steps to protect others




STAY HOME IF YOU'RE SICK

• Stay home if you are sick, except to get medical care.

COVER COUGHS AND SNEEZES

- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow.
- Throw used tissues in the trash.
- Immediately **wash your hands** with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, clean your hands with a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.

WEAR A FACEMASK IF YOU ARE SICK



• If you are NOT sick: You do not need to wear a facemask unless you are caring for someone sick (and they are unable to wear a facemask).



CLEAN AND DISINFECT

- Clean AND disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily. This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, and sinks.
- If surfaces are dirty, clean them: Use detergent or soap and water prior to disinfection.

TO DISINFECT:

Most common EPA-registered household disinfectants will work. Use disinfectants appropriate for the surface.

Options include:

Diluting your household bleach.

To make a bleach solution:

♦ 5 tablespoons (1/3rd cup) bleach per gallon of water

OR

4 teaspoons bleach per quart of water

Follow manufacturer's instructions for application and proper ventilation. Check to ensure the product is not past its expiration date. Never mix household bleach with ammonia or any other cleanser. Unexpired household bleach will be effective against coronaviruses when properly diluted.

Alcohol solutions.

Ensure solution has at least 70% alcohol.

Other common EPA-registered household disinfectants.

Products with EPA-approved emerging viral pathogens claims are expected to be effective against COVID-19 based on data for harder to kill viruses. Follow the manufacturer's instructions for all cleaning and disinfection products (e.g., concentration, application method and contact time, etc.).
