PROPERTY



STRIPER DIARIES EPISODE 21

I hope this message finds everyone healthy and well, as we try to adjust to our "new normal." With what seemed like weeks of wind, I decided to make this year's maiden voyage to Raritan Bay. There was no chance I was going to waste a weather window. After I loaded the boat, and assessed my fuel gauge... it was a go!

The preparation for a successful trip begins the night before. Spe-

cial thanks to Capt. Doug Toback for "face timing" with me, to review the navigation chart. Although, I have fished Raritan Bay several times, you can never be too prepared for the 20+ mile trip. Areas to be familiar with include Romer Shoal Lighthouse, named after the pilot boat William J. Romer, which sank in 1863, located on the north edge of Swash Channel, about ³/₄ of a nautical mile south of the Ambrose Channel, and 2¹/₂ nautical miles north of Sandy Hook, New Jersey. Thanks Doug for the safety tips!

After arriving, we saw several boats in the distance. I rarely pull up to a fleet and start fishing, so we motored into shallow waters to look for marks on my Garmin 7610. Within minutes we marked fish, so we deployed chartreuse mojos, trolling in about 20ft of water. The fish starting biting right away!! What a way to start the season! Cookie cutter, healthy striped bass in the 27 inch range, with some larger fish mixed in. What a blast! After several hours, we switched gears to casting bucktails and it was game time. Small schoolie bass on light tackle. What a day. Around 1:30pm, we decided to hightail it home. The forecast called for Southeast winds, which I did not want to contend with. Also, dead low tide was at 3:30 - not my favorite time to navigate the inlet. With a successful first trip of the season, I was feeling great. So... we decided to get some rest, and head back at first light. Our second trip was also a success. A bigger pod of fish arrived 24 hours later. We set up on the troll once again and within minutes the reels were screaming. By 10am we had landed 8 bass - keeping the smallest for the table at 28 inches. The slot limit did not hinder our trip at all. There was no arguing about "which fish to keep." Anything over 35 inches was immediately returned, as we watched the tails slap and swim away.

Our next fishing trips were local. We clam-bellied the Meadowbrook 2 and 3 bridges, on the incoming tide without even a tap. Bummer. My sunset plugging trips also produced nothing. With the opening day of fluke we decided to switch gears. Fluke fishing brings me back to my childhood memories of fishing with Jack Silber "jigsy". The infamous jigsy rigs are my favorite to use. We drifted the outgoing tide in the flats. Despite water temps in the upper 50s, the fluke were biting. Gulps and spearing/squid combos worked the best. We landed 3 keeper fluke!! Now that is a great day in my book!

We stayed out all day, since the sun was out and we wanted to enjoy every second we could. As we motored home on the 16 ft duck-boat, we ran into a school of blue fish! Yes, they have finally arrived! The day could not have been any better! Casting into blues until dinner time. Finally, I want to send my condolences to family of the mariners we lost in Jones Inlet. It's a reminder that when boating things can change in an instant. Let's all remember that safety must come first. I am never embarrassed to ask for help, or simply turn the around boat



when the wind picks up and head home.



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
