Offshore Tournaments Participation Off this Year

This year's offshore tournament participation has been down 20-25% according to an industry expert. The Babylon Tournament was way off, and it remains to be seen what the 1st Jones Inlet Tuna Invitational will draw. Unlike Shark tournaments where the distances and fees are at least half of the offshore tourneys, it certainly seems like the high fuel prices has major effects rippling through our beloved sport. According to some captains, they are not participating in high stakes offshore tournaments as in the past. They say it is harder to find crews willing to ante up \$500-\$1000 per man to cover all the costs of an overnighter. In general many blue water goers are limiting their offshore trips to less days, and waiting for the hot bite. Another factor is guys waiting for the Captains meeting to make a decision largely influenced by the weather forecasts. Another reason may be the spotty tuna catch, lack of a night bite, small fish and mixed weights of the fish. But regardless many more boats have fished this in the recent past.

The Babylon did not attract many anglers for the same reasons. About 17 boats participated down 50% or more from the last year. Soft business, high fuel, and a general feeling of reluctance are certainly factors. How does a small businessman lay off staff or cut benefits then go and spend a few thousand on a fishing tournament? It seems the overarching cost of living that has hit us Long Islanders from the cost of milk, eggs, taxes and fuel has trickled down to our big offshore tournaments and put a damper on this years events. However the bright side is that if you choose to go in, the competition is reduced, and your individual percentage of winning goes up that much more. So, always a silver lining!

- PRESS RELEASE AMBROSE LIGHT TO BE DECONSTRUCTED AFTER 41 YEARS OF SERVICE

NEW YORK-The deconstruction of Ambrose Light, situated about eight miles off the coast of Sandy Hook, N.J., in Ambrose Channel is scheduled to begin Monday, July 28, following extensive talks between the Coast Guard and local stakeholders.

"It was determined that Ambrose Light is not absolutely necessary to perform safe navigation through Ambrose Channel," said Chief Warrant Officer Darren Pauly, a Coast Guard Sector New York Aids to Navigation (ATON) officer. "Instead, several navigational aids will be added and Ambrose Channel will be extended to create a wider, more navigable channel for larger commercial vessels."

There will be no explosives used during the deconstruction. Divers will be conducting on-scene assessment of the anchorage and commercial harbor tugs Sea Wolf, Sea Bear and Miss Yevett will be assisting during the project.

The light's legs, stanchion, rotating light and anchorage were severely damaged following an allision with the commercial vessel Axel Spirit, a 799-foot tanker homeported in Nassau, Bahamas in Nov. of 2007. Personnel from Sector New York's Aids to Navigation Team established a temporary navigational aid after the allision while contractors assessed the damage to Ambrose Light.

"Ambrose Light has had three allisions since 1996. That is the main reason it is being replaced. It is not cost effective to rebuild the Light every time it is struck. With our improvements to the channel and newer Light-Emitting Diode (LED) technology, the optics on large buoys provide the same purpose and are easier to maintain," said Pauly

The demolition comes almost 41 years after Ambrose Light was established.

TUNA NOTES FROM AROUND

The 2008 giant bluefin tuna season is set to open Wednesday July 30 in Prince Edward Island. Fishermen are taking a slightly different approach to this year's fishery in hopes of spreading out the catches and capturing the prime market periods. The total quota for Island fishers this year is 150 tons, up from 147 tons in 2007. Also, the fishermen have agreed to limit their activity on the water to a five-day fishing week from Monday through Friday. There will be a limit of one fish per boat per day

-Yahoo! News is reporting that because of the sushi rage that has hit most of the western world and China, the bluefin tuna's survival is gravely threatened. Greenpeace and the World Wildlife Fund have begun to raise awareness about this issue. After World War II, the Australian population of bluefin completely collapsed due to overfishing. The same is now being seen throughout the Mediterranean.

-The Tarifa, a Spanish navy frigate, equipped with long range cameras, sophisticated electronic sensing equipment and a helicopter, stands ready in the Medittereanean to restrict the fishing and poaching of the bluefin tuna.

-Surging fuel costs have forced Japanese fishermen to suspend some tuna expeditions to the Pacific and Indian oceans.

-In general, more commercial fishermen's businesses are being

DEALING WITH FOGGY CONDITIONS

If possible, finding a spot to safely anchor is the best way to ride out foggy conditions. Once anchored, however you must sound your compressed air horn (or whistle) for 5 seconds during every minute anchored. If you hear another vessel approaching, give the sound signal to alert oncoming vessels to your presence... One Short Blast and One Prolonged Blast.

Should you find that you must operate a vessel in fog conditions immediately reduce speed and remember the proper following sound signals to avoid collision:-

- -2 Short Blasts: You are turning to port and will pass the other vessel on your starboard side.
- -3 Short Blasts: This means that a boat is slowing or stopping to avoid collision
- -5 Short blasts-This means DANGER. Use it or listen for it. A short blast is about one second; long blast 5 seconds.

Of course, use your radar if you have it and slow down when encountering a crowded area.

FLUKE CALCUTTA

The FTC web site has it the Peter McEvoy captured a 9 lb. 12 oz fluke. He will be leading the Calcutta with this fish, as soon as I get a weigh slip. 58 members have joined the 2008 fluke Calcutta. The Calcutta is \$10 per member; largest fluke from anywhere takes all. Fish must be free swimming and alive when caught on hook and line. There are no restrictions on inlets. Fish wherever the big one roams. The Calcutta will run as long as the NY fluke season remains open.
