LOOKING GOOD FOR AUGUST

July has just about passed and a series of storms and SE winds kept angler participation in the ocean down a bit. As I write this, looking at the week ahead I see moderate south and southwest winds and hopefully some typical, stable August weather. I am not tuned into the offshore scene, and received no first hand reports from FTC members. I did hear of some exceptional bites primarily from the eastern Canyons like the Fishtails and Atlantis on Bigeye and YFT. The Hudson had some moments but seemed slow overall. Some BFT were reported in the Coimbra area, but that's about it. All this can change in a moment, I hope that August brings calm seas and plentiful tuna within range of our

offshore anglers.



For most of July, West end ocean fluking has been disappointing this season. The best catches have come from patient anglers working deep structure. With a good effort, you can put it together. Just recently, the ocean fluking started to heat up and with some good weather we should see some good action. August is generally our best month of the year for fluke.

During the FTC Rodeo, Bob Pandy, Ken Donowski, and Anthony Donowski fished hard, with Ken catching his limit of fluke and sea bass. In addition, he took second place with a 3lb 13 oz. fluke with Bob Pandy taking third place with a 3.7 oz. flattie. Nice going guys.

Seabass fishing remains very good and should remain that way. You may need to pick through the little guys but limits are readily available. One day while I was fluking

in the bay, Mike and Maryellen Zullo pulled up in their newly repowered Pursuit, Magic Too. We spoke about the incredible numbers of seabass around. Mike said they been "pushing off" a bit for better quality fish. Sounds like good advice, there is less pressure in deeper water, further away from the half day boats which relentlessly pound our local bottom. So fishing a little deeper, and attempting to fish lightly hit structure (always a good idea) is sound advice. The boat looks great with those shiny new 300 Yami's, I'm sure they will serve you well, best of luck with

out the catch.

As a reminder, seabass regulations stand at 3 fish, greater than 15" June 23rd to August 31st increasing to 7 fish, September 1st to December 31st. Besides seabass, mixed porgies, ling, and triggers are available and round



The news at Montauk has been the excellent run of big bass available in the Montauk rips. Live porgies do most of the damage. Several of our club members have sailed charters with Captain Jim Krug on the Persuader with outstanding results. Mike Sullivan reported some

great fishing on his Blue Jacket II as well. Other Montauk news involves continued great seabass fishing and up and down fluking. Like our west end, August should see some fine fluking assuming the weather remains stable.

Ken Donowski reported that Kenny Kapner took his Real Catch II to Montauk for the month of July. They enjoyed outstanding fishing in Montauk two weeks in a row, with Ken Kapner's crews rewarded with quality fluke and seabass. Bob McVeigh had a nice 8.8 lb. jumbo and Marty Downing has

grabbed the lead in the FTC "Duke of Fluke" tourney with an impressive 9.9 lb. fatty flatty. Nice going all and thanks for sharing the reports.

The charge for summer storage of vessels on the property is \$5.00 per day or \$150 per month. When you receive your invoice for summer storage, please pay promptly. We no longer accept trailers for summer storage. Only members leasing a slip from FTC may store a trailer on the club property during the summer.

Winter storage lease agreements and invoices will go out in September to all FTC captains that stored their vessels with us last year. If you did not store with the club last winter and wish to do so this winter please email me you name, address, and length of your vessel.

Winter storage rates will increase this year to \$15 per foot with no minimum. Starting in 2018 only FTC members will be allowed to store their vessel on club property during the winter.

STRIPER DIARIES | EPISODE 6

With all the buzz of Tuna, Team Striper Sniper decided to switch gears. I mean who doesn't want to target Pelagics?? Long range trips on a single engine 24ft center console can be tricky. With that in mind, I check and triple check the weather using websites such as Terrafin - a paid service for only \$99.00 per year, which provides satellite images of chlorophyll levels, water clarity, and temperatures. It also gives coordinates and nautical mile distances. This is extremely beneficial. NOAA and sites such as Sail flow, dial in on wind speeds and direction. Safety gear, including a portable 6 man life raft are a great investment,

and an Epirb, which I have mounted on my hard top. Finally, I always leave a "float plan" with a buddy back home. Fuel, bait, tackle, ice, food - check, check, check, we are ready!!!

On the morning of July 3, 2018, we woke up with enthusiasm of landing a Tuna. But something strange happened. FOG! As we motored down Reynolds Channel, we couldn't see 20 feet in front of the boat. Oh boy, this is going to make for a long ride. We broke the inlet using radar, and although I have been in pea soup fog before, it is still nerve rattling. Our first stop was the Virginia, roughly 41 miles South East of Jones Inlet. We were greeted with clean blue water, sea turtles, porpoises and birds. Now that's a good sign. Lines in! We trolled Sterling tackle



spreader bars, green machines and joe shutes with ballyhoo. As the hours passed, we made our way towards the Rock Piles, and south to the Schooner. By 5:00 p.m. without any hits or knock-downs we started to wonder if we should get the heck out of there. So we made a decision to switch gears. Just a few miles away, in approximately 170 ft of water, we dropped clam on some deep water wrecks. Thank goodness we brought light tackle. Bam! Just like that double headers over the rail. It was lock and load fishing. Two (2) and three (3) pound sea bass on every drop. It was unbelievable! Within minutes we caught our limit. By 6:30 p.m. with the lateday sun and the wind picking up, we realized we had a very long ride home. Lines up and we headed back entering Jones Inlet around 8:30 p.m.

With Tuna still on the brain, we were already mentally planning our next trip. Truth is, you must go whenever you have a weather window. For us, the next chance was Friday July 20, 2018. With reports of fish caught at the Coimbra, we decide to head in that direction.

The ride out was beautiful and the water was calm. After 30 miles, we noticed massive amount of birds and good clean blue water. A quick look at the nautical chart, showed we had arrived at the Linda. We stopped, looked around and decided to see if there were any fish around. So we set our spread out. Trolling squid bars and green machines seemed to do the trick and BAM just like that fish on!!! Could it be a Tuna? I started praying to the fish gods and with sheer excitement yelled "grab the gaff". As the fish got closer, and we could see color, we realized it was a Bonito. Okay, not a BFT, but still a fish. III take it! We trolled and trolled without another tap. But, we stayed the course because of the old saying, "never leave fish to find fish." By 1:30 p.m. we began to think that was an "old wives' tale", so we packed up and took a ride west. Suddenly, we came across a weed line and a giant piece of floating wood. Stop the boat! Sure enough, we saw tropical fish and baby Mahi Mahi swimming around!!!! Grab the spinning rod and toss out a spearing, quick! Please fish gods, bite the line. I just wanted a picture. But we couldn't get the Mahi to bite. So, we played catch and release with small tropical fish that looked like they belonged in an aquarium. It was awesome! Another quick ride west to about 120 ft and we were back on the sea bass grounds. Lock and load sea bass again! We must have caught over 20 keepers, only keeping our limit. By 5:00 p.m. the wind started to pick up out of the east and we knew we had to start the journey home. We approached Jones Inlet by 7:00 p.m. and headed straight to Jordan's for some lobster and a cold beer. What an adventure!

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
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NOTICE TO ALL The Village of Freeport will be replacing to
