

## FISHING BULLETIN

Our fishing season is rapidly approaching the best time of the year in our areas waters. We can expect to see over the next several weeks a potpourri of species that we have or will encounter as the fall migration starts. Our weather will start to transform as winds from a more northerly direction signal that our areas water tem-

peratures are on the decline. This is the time of the year when tropical storms or hurricanes can potentially threaten our area as well. Although we do not venture out in this type weather the significance is that the weather can be volatile especially when venturing far offshore. Be mindful of changing conditions and do not be afraid to change your plans or cut your trip short should you be faced with making a weather related decision. This extra vigilance is the most important quality of the responsible boat owner.

The blue water action is starting to pick up on the canyon scene. The action from Block to Toms has been consistent as long as the weather allows anglers to venture out. The action is still a split between trolling to chunking. Some days the troll bite is better other days, nothing on the troll and action only at night. As the season wears on we will see a shift to chunking both day and night. Our club members have reported yellowfin and longfin action both day and night as well as a sprinkling of swordfish, which are becoming a very prevalent species in our areas canyons. The above average water temps this year have also brought on White and Blue Marlin action. Some club members have reported encounters with both species. Congratulations are certainly in order for the crew of the Aphis skippered by Howard Berman. This past weekend

they tallied several yellowfin and longfin and the highlight of the trip was a 120lb swordfish, which was bested by Captain Larry Festa. The fish was caught on a very light 40lb standup rod. On the way home they stopped for some tilefish action and managed two dozen before the winds and seas chased them home.

Shark fishing has not started up yet due to the water temps surrounding our offshore waters still a little on the high side. Hopefully over the next several weeks the action will pick up as the waters start to cool down some. This is the time of the year when the fall migration starts. For those of us who are interested in this fishery this time of year brings in some of the seasons best.

On the inshore scene large fluke are still being caught off of Fire Island and reports from our local inlet say that anglers venturing to Cholera and surrounding areas can be rewarded with quality sized fish as well.

Bluefishing continues to been non-stop. A trip to Cholera, 17 Fathoms or to the Mud Buoy is all it takes to load up.

Striped Bass has been on the slow side as of late. Cooler waters are all that it is going to take for this fishery to pick up again.

Seabass has picked up and a drop on the right spot is all that is need to catch this species. The action has been concentrated around the 60-95 ft drops.

### **Sun and Moon Affects on Fishing**

For centuries, anglers have looked to the moon for favorable fishing. Methods have developed over the years and the the Solunar Table was developed in 1936 by Alden Knight to account for the effects of the moon and sun over fishing.

The theory here is that are are "major" and "minor" periods of activity for fish every day that run like clockwork. According to Knight, the best "major" time to fish is when the moon in directly overhead, or "underfoot", meaning overhead on the opposite side of the world. The "minor" favorable times are periods just before the moon rises, or hours after is sets.

It is generally accepted that the period between the new moon (when the moon is dark)) and the full moon is optimal for catching fish. In one study, it was shown that 90% of catches occurred around a new moon!

Certain species are known to feed more actively during a full moon, such as Striped Bass, but other species such as Albacore appear to turn off during this period.

The moon revolves around the earth about every 29 days, and the Earth revolves Around the Sun, the distance-and pull-of the moon becomes greater and lesser during its four phases; full, last quarter, new and first quarter. (See tide table in newsletter for this month's dates)
