

As the month of October wears on the window of opportunity diminishes when planning an offhore trip. The days are starting to grow shorter, and the weather takes on a more volatile pattern vith Nor'Easters continually threatening. The general rule when planning any offshore trip in the all is a flexible schedule. This is also the time of the year when many potentially award winning ish are bumped out of contention by the fall migration of our offshore species.

Our canyon fishing has been hit and miss and consistent catches have not been the rule of thumb and should be at this time of the year. Most recently the Mickey Likes It returned from an overnighter with a dozen yellowfin despite engine problems earlier in the day, the trip went off with good results. Several other club members have been making trips on their boats or as crew on others and have reported yellowfin up to 80lbs.

Two years ago at this time we witnessed one of the best fall migrations of large school, medium and giant bluefin tuna, since the days of the Bacardi in 1989. I will hold out hope of this action to repeat itself this year as well. The fish were caught among a fleet of offshore draggers and scallopers located from the Bacardi area to the flats of the canyon. This action, if in the cards for this year should start to develop shortly.

The beginning of October also marks the start of our fall shark fishery. As in years past the best catches have been brought in during the fall run. The offshore waters are clean and the surface temperatures should be conducive to launch our fall season. If the fall run is anything like the late spring run that we had then get set for some decent fishing.

If you have bluefish on the mind then you just might want to point your bow to 17 Fathoms. The fishing has been incredible and there have been a few large fish around as well. During our fall rodeo the crew of Alexa Weinblatt and Jillian Edelman, aboard the Blue Marlin, had bluefish of 11.9lbs. and 11.5lbs. respectively to take first and second place in that category. The fall run is on.


Our inshore wreck fishing is starting to show promising signs for the fall season. Now that the season is open for seabass and blackfish more people will start to target them. Early indications look good. Lets hope that this is a good omen of things to come.

Lastly our fall striped bass run appears to have started. I don't think that it ever stopped, as this fishery is almost a year round one. Our members have reportedly been catching fish around the typical fall spots. This action will only get better as the area waters start to cool down. I have not been able to confirm if the bunker schools, typical at this time of year are in place to start their fall migration. If this is the scenario as in years past then it won't be long before the striped bass are hot on their heels.

We welcome the long awaited arrival of the "Camille" Sil & Camille Mazzilli's new 48 ft. Viking. Good Luck!





This is a faster, easier knot to create a double-line leader. Under steady pressure it is equally strong but does not have the resilience of the Bimini Twist under sharp impact. Not practical with lines above 30-lb test.
